
STANDARDS AND ATTITUDES

DEVELOPING OUR CORE VALUES

SCHOLARSHIP

On 1st April 2022 Handsworth Wood Girls Academy had their second personal development day of the Academic year. During personal Development days we collapse the normal lessons in order to allow students to access a wide variety of activities which enhances their curriculum.

Year 7 focused on Healthy relationships and were visited by Loudmouth Education and Training Theatre where students learned about different types of bullying, including cyberbullying and the impact of bullying. They identified harmful behaviours such as online bullying, abuse and harassment and how to report, or find support.

The rest of the day developed on these themes further, through bespoke lessons on 'bullying or banter?' violence and harassment and on-line grooming.

Year 8 focused on Character Education where they focused on developing confident oracy skills for life. We were visited by Talk the Talk who are a company that aims to develop these confident oracy skills for life. Talk the Talk enabled students' to find their voice and use it confidently to become leaders of the future. Through these workshops, students developed the skills needed to communicate with confidence through a variety of oracy tasks. They addressed employability challenges, how to improve self-esteem and enabled students to engage with others confidently and persuasively.

The workshops provided opportunity for students to prepare for essay writing, exams, presentations, debating, negotiating and listening skills. It also developed their interview techniques, and boosted self-confidence in their ability to connect with potential employers and demonstrate their employability skills.

Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 took part in careers workshops throughout the day.

Year 12 also Focused on Health Relationships, and they were also visited by Loudmouth who provided a drama production called 'Calling it out' which tackles issues surrounding harmful sexual behaviours, harassment, assault, misogyny, and consent. Narconon Drugs Prevention and Awareness also visited year 12. Their inspiring presentation discussed the harmful effects of drugs on relationships, aspiration and career goals. They then had bespoke lessons on forced marriages, Honour based violence, radicalisation and extremism.

Year 13 took part in a session with an emotional fitness guide who worked on them building confidence and resilience.

STEAM WORKSHOPS

A number of our students have taken part in the Beyond Blue Skies Biology programme of workshops exploring astrobiology— the search for life in space. Over three sessions the students followed the different methods and equipment scientists use to identify life found in extreme environments. Attending the programme has helped our students and given opportunities in enhancing their future skills needed in space related career pathways. BOM (Birmingham Open Media) is a centre for art, technology and science, dedicated to creative innovation with purpose.


The students responded really positively to the workshops, see some of their responses below:

BOM science has been such an amazing experience as it has help expand my knowledge in bacteria. By learning about how bacteria can be found anywhere and everywhere, and how to collect bacteria on petri dishes as well as learning how to produce a homemade petri dish - using household products. We have, also, learnt how to micro-pipet and about bento labs: Bento labs can stretch and grow the colonies and DNA to create a comparison and categorise them. In addition, we gram stained our then grown bacteria in the petri dishes to observe them under a microscope - gram staining allows the molecules to be seen easier. Within the last session, we used proper microscopes to further expand the images so that we can view the separate molecules, but we have also combined the arts and craft side of BOM science, by making resin bacteria in petri dishes and leaflets with the images of our findings in the different bacteria and fungi. BOM have made science more creative and artsy to allow a further understanding for students and pupils, making learning easier and fun. - **Evelyn Tran 10G**



We took part in many activities involving growing and inspecting our bacteria, etc. My favourite activity during the workshop by far is the activities: growing & collecting our bacteria where we found out that bacteria is everywhere, gram staining our bacteria on slides so we can inspect our bacteria easily by splitting into two different groups and inspecting our bacteria underneath a microscope. What I found underneath my slide was incredible. The microorganisms were quite beautiful, and it was hard to believe something this intricate and detailed is in something that resembles a splash of Ribena. SCIENCE FACULTY DELIVERS A WORLD CLASS TRIP TO CERN, GENEVA 29TH MARCH - 2ND APRIL 2022 WITH YEAR 13 STEM STUDENTS.



A collaboration between KEVI HWGA and KEVI Aston allowed our students to experience the most expensive and prestigious nuclear research centre (CERN) in the world. They learned about the world's largest particle collider that has given rise to explanations regarding anti-matter and new particles that existed immediately after the Big Bang. Students were attentive to the lectures on medical physics application which inflamed curiosity and triggered an array of questions (even ones the professor could not answer from Nimra!).

A day of experiments included: cloud chamber experiments and superconducting magnets making levitating magnets were one of the many highlights of this trip. Students worked together and formed new friendships with students from the other King Edward Foundation School. Vast amounts of information were digested including fun facts such as Tim-Berner-Lee, a British scientist at CERN, who invented the World Wide Web. We explored Geneva where they did very well to use their language skills and meet the locals, rode the transport independently, indulged in ice-cream and took pleasure in exploring the city and sight-seeing on a glorious sunny day.

The following day was a tour of the United Nations building - listening in and watching a live conference taking place! Students

were in awe of the grandeur of the interiors of the conference rooms and the donation exhibits from the countries that contribute towards it. A trip to the capital city of Switzerland, Bern Einstein Museum was the start of the next itinerary, where students found out about Albert Einstein's life, relationships, and theories as well as

a history of inventions by others;





route. On the same day they travelled to Interlaken where they explored the holiday village between the tranquil turquoise lakes against the mountains. Here they admired the breath-taking scenery which they recognised in some famous Bollywood movies and visited the honorary statue of the director - Yash Chopra. The final day was sub-zero temperatures and snow which was ideal for the destination: Mont Blanc - the highest mountain in the Alps. Here the students travelled to the peak, via cable cars and experienced amazing views and took their memories of a life-time photographs. After their descent they explored Chamonix a worldclass ski resort and warmed up with some delicious hot food before returning to the apartment hotel in France to pack. The student reviews were overwhelmingly positive, many saying it was a once in a lifetime trip. The social skills, cultural ex-

perience and independence has opened their eyes up to a wider perspective of the world around them and the opportunities beyond. It was also pleasing to see that they had embraced their embedded HPL skills: collaboration, big picture thinking, originality, seeing alternative perspectives and intellectual confidence in their behaviours and communication during their trip experiences. They are now independently planning their next trip!






Inspired by the masked singer HWGA staff took part in the masked reader, staff read exerts from books and the students had to guess who the members of staff were.
