Congratulations to all of our community on receiving the prestigious HPL World Class School Award. Our assessor highlighted the following strengths:

- 1. The leadership and implementation of HPL across the school in a short period of time especially the passion and determination of the senior and middle leadership team in putting HPL in place (despite the global pandemic). The processes to appoint key staff who have bought into the HPL vision at all levels has accelerated the embedding of HPL across key leaders in the school.



An inspiring talk that ended with information about the event Tech Rootz that took place in Birmingham.

YEAR 7— SCISPORT SHOWCASE

As part of the STEM program and to celebrate the Commonwealth Games, a group of year 7 students attended the SciSPORT showcase event at Millennium Point on Thursday 7th July 2022. This was a fantastic opportunity for our students.

The SciSPORT showcase includes interactive workshops, such as VEX robots which included the use of hi-tech VEX robotic equipment to develop teamwork, and technical and problem-solving skills followed by real-world examples of robots before taking part in the Robot Rumble. We then attended the Thinktank museum, and the students were fascinated with the chocolate wrapping machine! After a short break, the students attended the 'Fit for Life' workshop which used different pieces of sports testing equipment (e.g. balance boards and lung capacity testers) to improve their understanding of good health and fitness and how our bodies work. This included several competitions amongst them and was wonderful to see them being so passionate and competitive. Next, we attended the 'Science of sport' show where the girls got to experience how science is applied and used in the real world via sports to explain the scientific principles of forces and energy. In this lively show, the students got to test their reactions, learned how to sumo wrestle, demonstrated inertia, played crazy cricket to demonstrate friction, and even had to sit on a bed of nails to show pressure!

After lunch, the girls were given the chance to meet exhibitors and speakers within the science and sports industries as well as Universities and youth organizations. This also included inspiring athletes who have had success in the Commonwealth and Olympic Games and students will get to talk to them and learn about how they overcame challenges within their careers. Overall, it was a lovely day for all. The weather was superb allowing for a lovely picnic at lunchtime, it was interactive throughout, and the learning was never-ending plus a trip to the giftshop resulted in a lot of sugar and slime!







ACKERS ADVENTURE!

As part of The Prince's trust programme- the 'Physical and Wellbeing unit', I had arranged a visit for 35 students varying from years 7, 8 and 9 to the Ackers Adventure Birmingham on Thursday 7th July 2022. The Ackers Adventure promotes and engages all ages, abilities, and disabilities in the regular pursuit of outdoor adventure activities, offering a plethora of fun and exciting activities. This gave the students an experience to try new and varied activities such as rock climbing, archery and canoeing.

It was a fun and enriching experience for all involved.









PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT DAY - 28TH JUNE 2022

On Tuesday 28th June 2022 Handsworth Wood Girls' Academy had their third personal development day of the Academic year. During personal Development days we collapse the normal lessons in order to allow students to access a wide variety of activities which enhances their curriculum.

Year 7 focused on health and well-being, they had a day packed with exciting problem solving and team building activities that focused on being physically and mentally active whilst developing communication skills to solve the challenges. They were also visited by a guest speaker from Narconon Drugs Prevention and awareness who delivered an engaging session on the impact of drugs on the body and mental health. Year 7 also had sessions on the importance of physical activity and the important of a balanced diet to maintain good physical and mental health. They also had a session on sugar to raise awareness of the effects that it has on the body and to recognise the sugar in 'healthy' snacks. They were also visited by the smoothie bike company, year 7 enjoyed making healthy fruit smoothies on a bike. The faster they peddled the faster these were made and enjoyed!

Year 8 focused on relationships, they were visited by Loudmouth who provided a drama production called 'Safe & Sound' which helps young people to spot the misuse of power and control in relationship, understand consent and safeguard themselves against teenage relationship abuse. They then had a follow-on workshop where they were able to ask questions surrounding this topic. Year 8 also had lessons on healthy family relationships and peer-on peer abuse. They were visited by Stand Against violence who delivered an engaging talk on promoting good citizenship through tackling the issue of violence from multiple perspectives. Finally, they were Visited by PC Mann who delivered an assembly on Joint Enterprise and the laws associated.

<u>Year 9</u> Focused on Character Education where they focused on developing confident oracy skills for life. We were visited by Talk the Talk who are a company that aims to develop these confident oracy skills for life. Talk the Talk enabled students' to find their voice and use it confidently to become leaders of the future. Through these workshops, students developed the skills needed to communicate with confidence through a variety of oracy tasks. They addressed employability challenges, how to improve self-esteem and enabled students to engage with others confidently and persuasively.

The workshops provided opportunity for students to prepare for essay writing, exams, presentations, debating, negotiating and listening skills. It also developed their interview techniques, and boosted self-confidence in their ability to connect with potential employers and demonstrate their employability skills.

Year 10 had a day focused on STEM. STEM integrates the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Through STEM, students develop key skills including; problem solving, creativity, critical thinking and teamwork. Year 10 designed and made a model house, in order to do so, they had think critically about finance, loans, mortgages, as well as the steps to building a house such as costs and labour. Students needed to design this to ensure it came in on budget. Year 10 presented their design discussing all costs and expenditure. Some wonderful houses were built!

<u>Year 12</u> were also visited by Stand Against violence discussed tackling the issue of violence from multiple perspectives, they had practical sessions on self defence and resilience. The second half of the day gave them opportunities to think about their future careers and next steps. Year 12 had C.V workshops before developing their CVs and having an assembly on UCAS to support their applications to university's.
